



A word from Father Matthew.....

My coming to St. Joseph Parish in Alliance has been described by some as a **"Polish Invasion"**! This new priest comes in and starts changing

things...stirring the pot and upsetting the applecart. I ask that you be patient because there is a "method" to my "madness"! The changes I have made are just part of a five year plan I have to strengthen our present programs create new ministries to serve our parish community and share the message of the Gospel with others in the community of Alliance.

I urge you to read over this first issue of **"The St. Joseph Parish Newsletter"** and learn about the ministries available and the new programs beginning. We plan to issue a parish newsletter twice a year to keep you updated on activities and ministries in our parish.

I have enjoyed my first six months as your pastor. The welcome I have received has been overwhelming and I appreciate the kindness you have shown me. In my first six months I have established some new ministries and revamped existing ministries. We revamped our Bereavement Ministry which you can read about on page 8 and we are beginning a new Ministry in April designed to welcome back non-practicing Catholics who have wondered away from the Church entitled "Catholics Returning Home."

Since I am all about keeping our buildings in tip-top shape, you will notice some extensive renovations and updates being made in our buildings. I do not believe in putting a "band-aid" on a problem. I feel it is important to fix things thoroughly and professionally the first time so it does not cause additional damage. On pages 3, 4 & 5 you can read about the renovations to the Schwartz Center and Rectory that we are in the process of

completing.

The renovations to the Schwartz Center, particularly the installation of an elevator and renovation of the first floor kitchen will open the door for us to use Finnigan Hall for more parish functions such as Dinners, Reverse Raffles, Nite at the Races etc. It will also allow us to rent this room for Baby Showers, Rehearsal Dinners, Wedding Showers and small events. This rental capability will allow us to generate more income for our parish.

It is important that all people be provided the same opportunities regardless of a physical handicapped. For this reason I am passionate about making sure handicapped accessibility is available to our parish office, church and community buildings. For this reason we moved the parish office to the Schwartz Center, which you may read about on page 3, and I am pushing for the renovations to the Schwartz Center.

Because I believe in keeping our staff, parishioners and the belongings of the church safe, we have installed an alarm system through **Carnation Security** which allows video surveillance of our parking lot, church court yard and the Schwartz Center. We have also installed motion detectors in all offices at the Schwartz Center and the main entrance door.


Communication is of great importance and the phone system we had upon my arrival was outdated. We upgraded to a new phone system which gives all staff voice mail capability and allows me to be contacted in the even of a life and death emergency.

I am excited about my priestly ministry here and I look forward to getting to know you all as we travel on life's spiritual journey together. Our next newsletter will be published in August. 
Proposed Budget 2011-2012 Income (Column A)

A Word About our Church Finances by Rev. Matthew Mankowski, Pastor

As we approach the half mark of our fiscal year, our income appears to be in line with our proposed 2011-2012 budget. The stewardship of giving at St. Joseph Roman Catholic Church continues to be strong.

Changes in the parish community are expected with the change in pastor leadership. I am happy to announce that our parish census is rising.

Our big parish fundraiser of the year, "The Lucky Lottery Calendar" is not reflected in the "Other Parish Functions" income on the chart on page 2 as the payouts finished on December 31, 2011 and the profits of this fundraiser was not added to our general fund until after the first of the year.

The total profit from our Lucky Lottery Calendar was \$7,110. We sold a total of 367 calendars. I would like to personally thank all the sellers who made this fundraiser possible: **Paul Bankovich, Emma Beach, Cathie Bixler, Helen Bosick, Nancy Burkey, Jim Edwards, Becky Egli, Lori Gaspark, Judy Gatts, Larry Gatts, Dick Glasser, Nan Gwin, Norm Haidet, Patty Hampu, Sandy McCready, Barb Rogel, Nancy Saunier, Edie Scaia, Sam Scaia, Joan Smith, Bruce Snyder, Marlene Snyder and Anna Mae Welsh.** This fundraiser would not have been a success without the hard work and dedication of our sellers. We will begin promoting this annual fundraiser again on July 1, 2012 and our goal is to sell all 500

calendars by October of this year. If you would be interested in helping with this fundraiser, please give the parish office a call.

I would also like to thank **Jim Morrow** and his "crew" for organizing the concession once again at the Alliance Carnation Days in the Park in August. This concession sold meatball sandwiches and pies to patrons and raised \$1,263.00 for our church. Your dedication to your parish is overwhelming.

Since costs continue to rise, I would like to add more annual fundraisers. Fundraisers help to build community and get parishioners more involved. If you have a fundraiser suggestion, please feel free to contact the parish office with your ideas.

Our Parish Office Has Moved!

Our Parish office officially moved to the first floor of the Schwartz Center in December of 2011. Our office staff had outgrown the office space at the rectory and the entrance stairs were impossible for those with disabilities to maneuver. A handicapped accessible ramp was built by our maintenance men: **Tom May, Mike Johnson and Howard Henderson** so those unable to maneuver stairs may enter from the High Street entrance.

An old storage room was converted into our Parish Secretary's office and a receptionist window was built to accommodate those visiting the parish office.

Our Director of Religious Education shares an office with the Parish Bookkeeper located at the front of building facing Linden Street. The office across the hall houses our Pastoral Assistant/Office Manager and our Pastor. Father Matthew has retained his rectory office but meets with

those with disabilities at the Schwartz Center office.

Very little renovations were needed in order to accommodate the parish offices. Painting, installation of cabinets and shelving was completed by our most talented maintenance men. Additional electrical lines were installed by **Pauli Electric of Alliance** and new carpet was installed in the parish secretary and Pastoral Assistant/Office Manager's office by **Elite Flooring of Alliance.**

A new phone system was installed by **PTNE Telecom** which is user friendly and gives the option to leave voice mail. The new phone systems also give the user the option to reach Fr. Matthew in



the event of a life or death emergency.

On February 3 an alarm system was installed in the Schwartz Center complete with three cameras, a door release button and motion detectors. Special care and consideration was given to those who use the adoration chapel and alarm partitions were put in place to allow for movement in the hallway leading to the restrooms. If you have a key to the Schwartz Center and have not received an alarm code, please contact the parish office as soon as possible.

Renovations to the Schwartz Center

The St. Joseph Schwartz Center has been the “jewel” of our parish for many years and has served us well. The Schwartz Center currently houses our Parish Office, The St. Dominic Adoration Chapel, PSR Classrooms, St. Joseph Parish Library, a small meeting room and Finnigan Hall. Although our Schwartz Center is a beautiful building, there are many stair levels that are barriers to our elderly and those with physical handicaps and there is no handicapped accessible bathroom in the building at all. There is handicapped accessibility to St. Dominic Chapel which allows those in need of aide to enter for adoration and when our parish office moved to the Schwartz Center, our maintenance men **Tom May** and **Mike Johnson** built a handicapped accessible ramp on the High Street entrance of the building. This makes the building handicapped accessible to the first floor, but does not solve the problem of getting to the second floor. The lack of handicapped accessibility to our second floor hurts our ability to rent Finnigan Hall for added parish income and it also limits parishioner participation in parish events.

Our goal is to make our parishioners’ vision for the Schwartz Center a reality in 2012. The funds for the renovations to the Schwartz Center were previously earmarked through our Buildings and Grounds fund and do not affect the “General Operating Fund” of St. Joseph Church. In August of 2011 we entered into an architectural contract for services with Architect, **Peter R. Pano**. Mr. Pano prepared plans for an elevator to be built on the outside of the Schwartz Center building which would open up to the first and the second floors. The elevator will open up to the Parish Library on the first floor and directly into Finnigan Hall on the second floor.

The second plan for the Schwartz Center is to renovate the 1st floor kitchen and build a handicapped accessible bathroom in the Finnigan Hall on the 2nd floor. The planning for this renovation is being managed by parishioner, **Joe Laure** of **Accent Home Improvements**. Plans have been drawn up for a complete remodel of the 1st floor kitchen to make it more user friendly with new appliances, cabinets, counter tops and flooring. Our hope is with the renovations to the kitchen combined with our handicapped accessibility modifications, we will be able to use our Finnigan Hall more for parish functions and as a source of rental income. The renovations to the Schwartz Center will serve the parishioners of St. Joseph Parish for many years to come.

The Rectory Make-Over

The St. Joseph Rectory was built in 1907 and although it is a beautifully built home, it is in dire need of renovations for both safety and comfort. An independent insurance adjuster from Nationwide recently inspected the rectory, at our request and was alarmed by the outdated electrical wiring present in the home. The home has over 4489 square feet of living space and none of the electrical outlets in the home were grounded. In some areas there were actually exposed, bare and worn wires. This was an dangerous, fire hazard and needed to be updated immediately. We entered into a contract with **Pauli**

Electric, Inc. of Alliance, to re-wire all three levels of the rectory and get the building up to code at an estimated cost of \$13,064. Paulie Electric began work in December of 2011 and should be finishing up by the end of February.

There is no central air conditioning in the living quarters of the rectory and we have been relying on single window air conditioning units which are costly, ineffective and a security risk. The cost for new duct work; installing a drop ceiling to accommodate the duct work plus the cost of the actual central air conditioning units were estimated at \$16,725. We opted to install a drop ceiling to accommodate the duct work needed because to run ductwork


through the existing walls would have proven too costly. We contracted with **Hill's Heating and Cooling of Alliance** to install the air conditioning units and our parishioner, **Joe Laure of Accent Home Improvement** to manage the installation of the drop ceiling.

The carpet throughout the home was very old. The newest portions of carpet, located in the living and dining rooms, were over 25 years old. The carpet in the bedrooms were vintage 1972. As you well know, even carpets well maintained last only about 10 years. Although new carpet may be a quicker solution we decided to install a wood laminate in the living room, dining room and two bedrooms on the second floor.

The management of this portion of the renovation is **Joe Laure of Accent Home Improvements** and the floor is being purchased through **Elite Flooring of Alliance**.

Since the rectory was built in 1907 the layout was such to accommodate servant preparation rooms. As a result, there were small rooms attached to the dining room, kitchen and two bedrooms. We contracted with **McCaulley Building & Home Improvement of Canton**, to remove some of the walls surrounding these small rooms to create bigger living spaces and eliminate non-functional areas. There are also two small bathrooms located on the second floor which are located next door to each other. We remove the wall between these two bathrooms and create one larger bathroom. McCaulley's estimated the cost of this work at \$6400. They began work in December and will finish up their work following the completion of the electrical and plumbing work. The workmanship of the McCaulley's crew has been phenomenal. Their eye for detail and keen craftsmanship created a finished product that kept the original integrity of the home in tact.


Moving walls and relocating radiators became quite a job during this renovations so we

enlisted the help of **LPM Mechanical** to move several pipes throughout the home and aide with the plumbing in the upstairs bathroom.

Because some of the walls and ceilings have been damaged over the years, all walls and ceilings throughout the entire rectory are being repaired and painted by our maintenance team: **Tom May, Mike Johnson and Howard Henderson**. Our maintenance team has also been installing dry-wall in some of the rooms and finishing the bathroom on the third floor that has been inoperative for over 20 years.

We are hopeful that all renovations will be done by March so that Fr. Matthew can move out of the maid's quarters over the garage and begin living in the rectory. These renovations and updates were essential for the safety of anyone who lives in this home and will accommodate future priests for years to come. All renovations were approved by Bishop George Murry of the Diocese of Youngstown and are being funded by the Building and Grounds fund and partially by a recent bequest from the estate of **Mary Mustica**.

Youth Masses are held every three months with all grades participating as readers, greeters, ushers and gift bearers. The little ones also entertain us with a song!


The Youth group has combined with St. Ann Church. They meet bi-weekly on Sundays from 12:30p.m.—2:30 p.m. alternating between the two parishes.

Do you know someone who has left the church? Most of us do not have to look very far to find non-practicing Catholics in our circle of family and friends. May of us are concerned about these loved ones however we don't know how to help them. Obviously, most of them are searching, but how can we help them find their way home?

As baptized, practicing Catholics we have a precious gift of faith and love from the Lord that needs to be shared with our non-practicing brothers and

sisters. First, we need to pray for them. Secondly, we need to extend a personal invitation to them to come home to the Catholic Church. Most non-practicing Catholics are waiting for an invitation to return. Many mistakenly think they are excommunicated and are not welcome to return for a variety of reasons.

Many non-practicing Catholics carry a tremendous amount of guilt and misinformation about the Church so they are afraid of approaching the Church for fear of being rejected. You can make a tremendous difference in someone's life simply by reaching out to them and telling them that we miss them and would like for them to come back to our Church family.

Here at St. Joseph Church we have a special program to help non-practicing Catholics return to the Church called Catholics Returning Home. The next series begins Wednesday, April 11, 2012 at 6:30 p.m. in the Schwartz Center. This is a six week series with the first session lasting about 1 1/2 hours and the remain sessions lasting no more than an hour. The following is an outline of the session subjects:

- 4/25: The Church Today: Changes Since Vatican II
- 5/2: Explanation of the Mass,

St. Joseph Bereavement Ministry

On November 29, 2011 parishioners from St. Joseph and St. Ann Churches came together for instruction and training to form two separate bereavement ministries, one for St. Joseph Parish and one for St. Ann Parish.

The St. Joseph Bereavement Ministry is made up seven parishioners who have paired up to form three teams.

When a parishioner passes away, the assigned team goes out to

the home of the grieving loved one, prays with them, presents them with our St. Joseph Bereavement Booklet and guides them through the process of planning a funeral Mass or Service. They also keep in touch with this individual or family through cards of support, phone calls and prayer throughout the first year after their loved ones death.

We are presently revamping our policies

and procedures concerning funeral luncheons. Presently, we have five volunteers to work our funeral luncheons. To avoid "burn out", we would like to get a few more volunteers so we can form two teams.

It is our goal to relieve as much burden from the grieving family as possible.

The Wheels on the Bus Go Round and Round submitted by Larry Gatts

The Saint Joseph Church bus was purchased in late May 2009. The bus was purchased as a service for our parishioners who were unable to come to Mass. With some minor repairs, sprucing up and lettering we were up and running for Mass that fall, with the first mass run in October.

For the first adventure, the greatest need seemed to be for the 4:00 p.m. Mass on Saturdays. We began with one Mass per weekend but discovered the need was larger than expected. A couple of months later we began serving our parishioners

for the 10:30 a.m. Mass on Sundays. There has been many times where we needed to do two runs on Saturday, also. On Saturdays we usually always had a full bus, carrying eleven passengers. The bus holds eleven passengers, plus the driver and a helper. It is also wheelchair accessible and has the capacity to carry two wheelchairs at a time with the use of the lift. At this time we have a roster of seven parishioners for Saturday, with a couple additions occasionally. On Sundays we serve five parishioners sometimes six.

The bus has

served many purposes besides getting our parishioners to church. It has been used to take parishioners to the church picnic, to Tetelestai, to stand for 'Right to Life' in front of the abortion clinic in Youngstown and Planned Parenthood in Canton. It has also been used to take different groups to outings such as the youth ministry group, the Funtastiks, Regina/St. Joseph students to their service project and by St. Ann's youth ministry group.

George and Mary Weber, co-chairmen, with my wife **Judy**, and I take care of scheduling all

trips. Our goal is to serve God through service to you, St. Joseph parishioners.


